Shamsher Singh 1924 - 2011 Founder, Sri Hemkunt Foundation, Inc

Shamsher Singh graduated from Punjab university & Established himself as one of the leading exporters of industrial machinery from India to Burma; Thailand to Malaysia; Singapore to Cambodia; and Kenya to Nigeria.

He worked as member, secretary and general secretary in Patna (Bihar) – the sacred birthplace of Guru Gobind Singh on the Prabandhak Committee Takhat Sri Patna Sahib.

He worked as a Founder Trustee and general secretary of Gurdwara Sri Hemkunt Sahib Management Trust. The buildings designed and erected at Sri Hemkunt Sahib, Gobind Dham, Gobind ghat, Joshimath, Srinagar (Garhewal), Rishikesh and Hardwar during this period are really amazing.

In 1980, he established Sri Hemkunt Foundation Inc.

in New York, USA for the sole purpose to convey the Guru's message to the children/ youth Diaspora. He organized Symposium and awarded Rewards to winners. In the last 30 years, the participation has grown from 19 to over 2,000. The program has reached various parts of USA, Canada, Kenya and United Kingdom.

Presently, 69 Gurdwaras in the western hemisphere participate in the program. In the year 2007 (at the age of 82 years), he started a Keertan Darbar program. Under this program, youth (10 – 25 years age) recite Shabads in the same Raags that were written and recited by Guru jees themselves. Every year three different Raags are prescribed, one to each of the three age groups. Primary objective of the program is to revive the use of string instruments – Rabab and Saranda – which were used by Guru jees while reciting the Shabads.





The younger diaspora is living in a whole new world. Elders need to redirect the "frontier-spirit" to one focused on deconstructing - not in the sense of tearing down Hemkunt as an institution, but instead to focus on rethinking and reconfiguring what we have and who we are, to adapt and assure success over the next few decades and centuries.

The idea is to be choosy about the sponsors and organizers who can further Hemkunt's ideology. Perhaps, we can organize a swearing-in-ceremony for renewing vows to the core tenets, including Sangat-da-bhala (community betterment), Abhyaas (practice), Gyan (proficiency/knowledge), Maryada (respectable behavior/code of conduct), and Ummidaan (hopes and expectations). That is Hemkunt. Anything else is just a country club.

Judges for the Hemkunt Symposium should be qualified on multiple dimensions, ensuring that they know their content thoroughly and demonstrate skills of impartiality. Most specifically, they need to stay true to the judging rubric. The ambience at the event should be positively encouraging so that everyone is propelled to get involved. Furthermore, the event coordinators should inculcate a culture of collaboration and feeling of growth as a community, even after the event is completed. When I participated in Hemkunt, I had hoped that the bonds I formed with fellow participants would be life-long. Unfortunately, for some reason, they fizzled out immediately after coming back home.



The symposium speech competition has played a crucial role in my development allowing me to develop a sense of comfort presenting to an audience and providing me with the tools necessary to do so effectively. My earliest memories of the speech competition were from the first times I competed as a relatively young child. At these initial stages while the speech was mostly written by my mother, a large portion of the preparation for the competition was spent first understanding the precise message we sought to communicate for each question and then honing a presentation which would accentuate that meaning for each answer, focusing on the use of vocal cues or nonverbal gestures.

Through this process, while of course learning a tremendous deal about the history and values which are a crucial part about being Sikh, there were a number of lessons regarding presentation which have been invaluable. Among these lessons, I learned that mastery of the precise topic one was discussing is an invaluable part of presentation, that a large portion of effective communication is non-verbal, and that being able to communicate one passion for the topic at hand is crucial in any presentation. As an aspiring academic mathematician, while my primary role is as a researcher, a substantial portion of my time is devoted to both listening and presenting works at academic venues. While these talks often take a substantially different format than the symposium speeches, being an hour long and involving a substantial interactive portion through question and answers, the principles of effective communication with an audience still apply.

In particular, while recent developments within the field are formally communicated through papers, in practice such talks and presentations serve as crucial venue for spreading ideas. Therefore, effectively communicating one's ideas allow them to be used in future developments and being an adept communicator is a highly valued skill within the field. The speech competition's early practice with thinking about how one should present material, what points of a topic should be emphasized and how, and being able to judge how engaged the audience is have been invaluable. Furthermore, general comfort in front of an audience has also been useful other times in this professional sphere; recently I was asked to introduce a plenary speaker at a conference in front of a few hundred attendees. Given the number of times I had presented as a child through the speech competition preparing for this situation on short notice was within my comfort zone. This general comfort with an audience has been among the most valuable gifts that the speech competition has given me.

When I am not lawyering, I love spending time with my wife, Anna, and our three sons, Leo, Felix, and August. I have also become obsessed with playing golf (though I am really not very good--yet). I also like reading, watching playoff basketball, and playing basically any board or card game I can get my hands on.





Dr. Jaswant Singh Sachdev, M.D., F.A.A.N., a board certified Fellow of the American Academy of Neurology, has been practicing Neurology in Phoenix, Arizona, U.S.A since 1976.

Before migrating to United States in 1972, Dr. Sachdev completed his post-graduate studies in medicine (M.D.) He had a bright academic career and was the recipient of several Gold Medals including an award for the "Best Graduate" of the MBBS class of 1967. Thereafter, he taught at the Government Medical College, Patiala, Pb., India. Since his arrival in Phoenix in 1976, he has been involved in various local Indian community services. He has been one of the Sevadars for the construction of two Gurdwara Sahib in Phoenix area. Every month once a month since 2000, he has been heading a Seva (service) group with the help of his wife and several other Sikh volunteers to prepare and serve free hot fresh full meals to about 150 - to 250 homeless citizens. Thus far about 30,000 meals have been served.

He has been regularly offering power point presentations to non-Sikh groups about Sikh faith and Sikh people in Gurdwara Sahib itself as well as at various colleges, community centers, adult homes, groups and churches when invited.

Sri Hemkunt Foundation was founded in 1980 in New York. It was established by 11 dedicated visionaries who observed that the Sikh youth living in the Western countries lacked knowledge regarding the high ideals of their religion and were therefore losing their Sikh identity.

THE LONG JOURNEY OF SRI HEMKUNT FOUNDATION

In an effort to improve the situation, the Foundation created an environment where children could learn the spiritual, moral, and religious teachings of Sikhism. Since then, the promotion of learning Punjabi, Kirtan, Gurbani, Philosophy, History and Sikh culture has been the cornerstone of the Foundation.

Objectives & Purpose

S. Shamsher Singh (1924-2011) established the not-for-profit organization in 1980 in New York for the purpose of connecting the children growing up in the western hemisphere with Sikhi. The objective of the organization was to help children be proud of being a Sikh and also help them explain it to others who knew nothing about Sikhi. The program also included developing children's public speaking skills. These skills are vital

for children to excel in any profession they choose in life.

Children are divided into five age groups, viz, 6-8, 9-11, 12-14, 15-17. and 18-25. Age-appropriate books/ topics are assigned to each group. Participants present answers to the specific questions in a specified time from the podium. A set of three judges evaluate the speech for both the contents and presentation. Every participant is recognized with an appreciation award to encourage them. Winners are awarded additional prizes.

In 2007, we added another segment to our annual program where children are encouraged to recite Shabads in the same Raag as recorded in Sri Guru Granth Sahib. Children also use string instruments (Rabab, Saranda, Taus etc.) used by Guru jees or that were used during their period.

Foundation Mission, Process & Resource Development

The foundation's program is a three tier activity. The first tier is the Gurdwara level. 30 participants are required to recognize a Gurdwara as a unit, called a "Center". The person coordinating the program is called a "Center Convener". There are 75 gurdwaras spread over the USA, UK and Kenya participating in the Foundation's program. A group of 3 or more Gurdwaras constitute the second tier called a "Zone". The person coordinating a Zone's activity is called a "Zonal Convener". The first and second position holders in each age-group participate in the Zonal Symposium.

First position winners at the Zonal Symposium participate in the third and the final tier

symposium. We call it an "International Symposium". Participants from various States of the USA (New York, New Jersey, Florida, Michigan, California, Texas etc.), UK (London) and Kenya gather together at the specified venue (rotated every year) for the grand finale of the Symposium.

All activities at Center, Zonal and International level are performed by dedicated selfless
Sewadars. It includes conveners, judges, time keepers and many more to conduct the program.
The Foundation has not made an appeal for funds or held a fundraising event in the last four decades. The Foundation's administrative and overhead expenses during all these years have been zero. All work is performed by dedicated volunteers as Sewa. The 13 Board Members contribute annually to fund the prizes awarded to winners and participants at the international event.

Books published by Foundation

In 1980 we started with Bhai Vir Singh's books. The books were primarily in Punjabi. For some books English translation were available. The children growing up in the western hemisphere could not connect with the social context in Bhai Vir Singh's books. We switched to books written and published in India by other authors. Parents commented that these books present Guru jees' life with miraculous powers instead of

presenting the teachings based on logic and reasoning. The sewadars of the Foundation undertook the project of writing books for Groups 1, 2, and 3 based on parents/participants comments over the years. These children are very young. They are generally helped by parents and grandparents to prepare the speech. Books written by the Foundation portray the Gurus' teachings in a rational and logical manner. Permission from the Foundationis not required to use the books in Sunday Schools or by anyone else.

Success story that can be considered as truly inspiring?

Over the last 43 years, participants have excelled in various professions. We are proud to say that they have retained their Sikhi Swaroop. Gurbir Singh Grewal (Director of the SEC's Division of Enforcement, formerly Attorney General, New Jersey), Kamal Singh Kalsi (Lt. Colonel in the US Army), Ravinder Singh Bhalla (Mayor, New Jersey) are just a few examples. Some have moved on to serve in other Sikh organizations e.g., Sikh Coalition.

Memorable incidents from the competitions

In 2005 the international program was held at New York. We had invited Navdeep Singh Bains, who served as Minister of Innovation, Science, and Industry in Canada. He was very young, in his 30s, a Member of Parliament, Canada and a visibly recognizable Sikh. During his keynote speech he narrated his personal experience with the Foundation. The book was on the Life of Guru Nanak. He prepared his speech in Punjabi for an extra prize. He remembered the entire speech by heart and was confident of his preparation. When he came to the podium and started to address the audience, he blanked out upon seeing so many people in front of him. He simply said, "Guru Nanak ji was a good person" and left the podium. Since then, he has developed public speaking skills and can address the parliament with full confidence.

How do you think that the Foundation is succeeding in its mission?

Examples provided under earlier questions are proof that the Foundation is succeeding in its mission. Moreover, children of the parents who participated decades ago are participating now. Parents are convinced of the benefits of the Foundation's program.

Any new ideas and projects that the Foundation is looking at for the future?

We have written books for age groups 1, 2 and 3. One book for group 5 was co-authored by S. Bhupinder Singh, Houston, USA, and S. Paramjit Singh, Virginia, USA, and me. These are available in English and Punjabi on our website for free. We are working on getting the illustrations prepared from young artists so that the children can better connect with them. We plan to have printed books available through Amazon at a very reasonable cost. We are also planning to have books available on Kindle.

The maximum Sikh population is in India. So what about an India Zone or may be multiple zones there?

We would love to extend the program to children in India. Immigration issues hold us back. Every year the international event is hosted in a different zone (city). Every time it is held in USA/UK, children in India would require a tourist visa. Parents and grandparents of young children generally accompany them to the international event. Visa requirements would complicate the entire program.

However, we encourage dedicated volunteers to start this program in their country. We are ready to guide and help them in every manner possible. If needed, we are willing to visit them and provide guidance in person.

BOLE SO NIHAAL SAT SRI AKAAL!

JASMEET KAUR KOCHER

The salutation "Bole So Nihal Sat Sri Akal" is a commonly used by Sikhs, often loudly and enthusiastically in congregational settings or during religious ceremonies.

First part of the Jaikara is "Bole So Nihal" means "whoever utters shall be fulfilled". The second part "Sat Sri Akal" means "Eternal is The Great Timeless Lord". Sat Sri Akal shouted in unison, responding to the call — Bole So Nihal is a call to action, or expression of ecstatic joy or an invocation for Divine aid.

Sat Sri Akal

In literal words Sat (Sanskrit satya) means 'true', 'real' or 'eternal'; Siri is an honorific denoting 'grace' or 'majesty'; Akal means ''Timeless' 'Eternal' or 'Transcending Time'. Sat Sri Akal has been used since the creation of the Khalsa. In the normal situation when two Sikhs meet, with folded hands on either side in mutual courtesy and respect they exchange greetings of Sat Sri Akal pointing out the glory of God to each other.

The combination of "Bole So Nihal" and "Sat Sri Akal" is a way for Sikhs to energize and unite themselves in the name of their faith. It is a way of showing reverence and acknowledging the shared spiritual nature of humanity. It serves as a reminder of their shared values, commitment to Sikh principles, and the victorious spirit that permeates their community. It is often used to celebrate and uplift the spirits of fellow Sikhs, reinforcing their collective identity and devotion to their beliefs.



WAHEGURU JI KA KHALŞA WAHEGURU JI KI FATEH

JASMEET KAUR KOCHER

"WaheGuru Ji Ka Khalsa, WaheGuru Ji Ki Fateh" is a Sikh phrase that holds great significance and is commonly used by Sikhs in various contexts.



"WaheGuru" is a term used by Sikhs to refer to God. It is a combination of two words: "Wahe" meaning wonderful or awe-inspiring, and "Guru" meaning teacher or enlightener. So, WaheGuru can be understood as the wondrous and enlightening presence of the divine.

"Ji" is an honorific suffix used in the Sikh tradition to show respect towards God. It is added after the name or title to express reverence and humility.

"Ka Khalsa" translates to "belonging to the Khalsa." The Khalsa is a community of initiated Sikhs who have undergone a special ceremony called "Amrit Sanchar." They commit themselves to living according to the Sikh code of conduct and upholding the principles of Sikhism. Referring to oneself as "Ka Khalsa" expresses a sense of belonging and identification with the Khalsa community. They are dedicated to living according to the principles of Sikhism, such as honesty, equality, and selfless service.



Ki Fateh: "Ki Fateh" means "victory belongs to." It signifies the triumph of the divine and the ultimate victory of righteousness. By saying "WaheGuru Ji Ki Fateh," Sikhs acknowledge that all victories and successes come from the divine and attribute any triumphs to God's grace.

So, when Sikhs say "WaheGuru Ji Ka Khalsa, WaheGuru Ji Ki Fateh," they are expressing their devotion to the wondrous and enlightening presence of God (WaheGuru) and recognizing the Khalsa community. They also affirm that victory belongs to God and acknowledge the divine's role in their achievements. It is a way of affirming their dedication to living according to Sikh principles and seeking God's blessings in all aspects of life.

SIKHI AND ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION

JOGISHWAR SINGH, PHD (Switzerland)



Sikhism, a monotheistic religion that originated in the Punjab region of India in the 15th century, has a strong tradition of environmental protection and preservation. This is rooted in the belief that the natural world is a manifestation of the Divine and that all living things have equal value so they should be treated with respect and compassion.

The Sikh holy scripture, the Sri Guru Granth Sahib ji (SGGS), contains numerous references to the importance of preserving the environment and living in harmony with Nature. For example, it states that "The earth is a sacred place and all living things are part of the Divine". Also, "The creation of the world is a wonder; the protection of all is the duty of the Lord". These teachings remind Sikhs that the natural world is not just a resource for human use but a sacred creation that should be protected and respected. Sikhs are also encouraged to engage in practices that promote environmental stewardship, such as planting trees, protecting wildlife and conserving water. Many Sikh organisations and Gurdwaras around the world have implemented environmental initiatives, such as solar panel installation, rainwater harvesting and recycling programs. These actions demonstrate the practical application of Sikh teachings on the environment and the importance placed on preserving the earth for future generations. Furthermore, Sikhi promotes the principle of "Sarbat da Bhala" which means well-being of all. It emphasises on the idea that the well-being of the human race and the well-being of the environment are interconnected. This principle encourages Sikhs to

consider the impact of their actions on not just themselves but on all living beings and the environment as a whole. It also highlights the interconnectedness of all living things and the importance of working towards the betterment of all. Sikh teachings on the environment also extend to the concept of "Sewa" or selfless service. This includes serving and protecting the environment, as well as other living beings, as a form of devotion to the Divine. Many Sikhs participate in volunteer work to clean up local parks and rivers, plant trees and take other actions to protect and preserve the environment. One of the most important examples of Sikhs' dedication to environmental protection used to be their commitment to the protection of forests, which had been a traditional practice of the community for centuries. Sikh history is replete with events in Lakhi jungle or Machhiwara jungle. Punjab used to have such large forests which provided shelter to Sikh groups fleeing genocide at the hands of Mughal rulers in Delhi and their factotums in Punjab. So many idioms used in Sikh daily life originate from those times of life spent in the forests of Punjab. Today when the forest cover in Punjab has fallen to below 5%, it is time to renew our tradition of playing an active role in such protection, both in India and overseas. In India, Sikhs should become instrumental in trying to preserve the natural forests of the Punjab region which has been considered as one of the most bio-diverse areas in the country. A very commendable recent effort in this context has been the action by mainly Sikh and other civil society groups which saved the Mattewara forest area from destruction which had been planned in order for an industrial complex to be set up there. Sustained action by Sikh social activists, supported by some others, succeeded in forcing the Punjab government to abandon the industrial project envisaged for Mattewara.

More such efforts need to be initiated. The order by the Punjab government to stop the Marlbros Ethanol Plant near Zira has also thrown light on efforts by Sikh civil society to curb activities which pose a health hazard to lives of people by polluting their drinking water supplies and fields. The Green Revolution in Punjab has in time become not a boon but a bane through unbridled use of chemical fertilizers, coupled with excessive use of groundwater which has caused severe shortages of supply. Pessimistic predictions say that Punjab will run out of groundwater by 2050 if not earlier, if its use is not better regulated to protect the environment. So far, governments in Punjab have mostly paid lip service to environmental protection. They now need to take strict action to slow down environmental degradation which has turned vast areas of Punjab into hotbeds of people suffering from cancer, depleted groundwater sources and chemical fertilizer poisoning of fields leading to diminishing returns in agriculture. Central governments in Delhi have always discriminated against Punjab by not setting up any mass employment industries there. The usual excuse being that Punjab is a border state. So is Gujarat for that matter but so much heavy industry has been set up there. I have observed that the young generation is distancing itself in large numbers from religious belief in several

countries and religions. Youngsters are raising questions about religion and politics. Geta Thunberg and other young people in Western Europe have made environmental protection a major issue even outside this area. For example, the Green Party had its best ever electoral score in Switzerland in the federal parliament elections in October 2019 with a lot of its elected members being 35 years old or under. Young people are now putting pressure on ruling dispensations that urgent steps should be taken for environmental protection to counter climate change / global warming, keeping in view their future. Politics as usual is no more an option in several countries. Climate change and global warming have become topics of daily discourse even if some people like Donald Trump continue to label these as fiction. Denying these facts is like a stork burying its head in the sand. Temperatures are rising every summer in the Arctic, the ice cap is melting at a fast rate. Poor countries like Honduras and the Philippines have faced multiple hurricanes in the past months. Even the US, where the former President trued not just to overturn the results of a general election but also refuses to accept the scientific evidence of accelerating climate change, has seen very high financial and human life losses in California due to massive wildfires and unprecedented flooding. I see around my own house in Switzerland that less and less snow seems to be falling every winter. India is being hit with stronger floods, heavy rains and draughts. No purpose is served by denying this. Joshimath town in Uttarakhand has started rapidly sinking because of indiscriminate road building and other construction activity. In this context, we need to spread the environmental protection message of Sikhism, so well contained in the message of its founder, Sri Guru Nanak Dev ji. He says in the concluding lines of the Sikh morning prayer, the Japji Sahib: "Air, water and earth; Of these we are made; Air like the Guru's word gives the breath of life, To the babe born to the great Mother Earth, Sired by the Waters, The day and night our nurses be, That watch us in our infancy, In their laps we play, The world is our playground, The Sikh Bulletin.

Our acts right and wrong at Thy court shall come to judgement, Some be seated near Thy seat, some ever kept distant, The toils have ended of those that have worshipped Thee, O Nanak, their faces are lit with joyful radiance - many others they set free" (Page 50 of "Japji - The Immortal Prayer-Chant, Translated by Khushwant Singh, Abhinav Publications) Most of us Sikhs recite these lines like parrots every morning but how many of us try to act on these words? Not only here, Guru Nanak Dev ji talks about Mother Nature also in Asa ki Vaar. He uses the word "Kudrat" (Nature in its broadest sense) in many stanzas. "Kudrat" here is synonymous with the Divine Life Force, Almighty Waheguru. Here is an example from Asa ki Vaar where the word Kudrat has been translated as "His" meaning the Almighty: "By His Power we see, By His Power we hear, By His Power the Nether Worlds exist, and the Akashic Ethers, By His Power the entire creation exists, By His Power the Vedas and the Puranas exist, and the holy scriptures of the Jewish, Christian and Islamic religions, By His Power all deliberations exist, By His Power we eat, drink and dress, By His Power all love exists, By His Power come the species of

all kinds and colors, By His Power the living beings of the world exist, By His Power wind, water and fire exist, By His Power earth and dust exist, Everything is in Your Power, Lord; You are the all-powerful Creator, Your Name if holiest of the Holy, O Nanak, through the Command of His Will, He beholds and pervades the creation; He is absolutely unrivalled" (Source: manpreet159.wordpress.com) In recent years, many Sikhs have also been working to raise awareness about climate change and its impact on the environment. They have been active in organising and participating in rallies, marches and other events to call for action on climate change and advocate for sustainable living. Sikh institutions like the SGPC have been a miserable failure in highlighting the nexus between the Sikh religion and environmental protection. Mired in petty politics, they have betrayed the community's trust. Sikh civil society, both within and outside India, needs to overcome SGPC failure to lead. A large number of Sikhs have settled outside India. They now constitute a global presence. They need to actively inform their local communities about the environment friendly essential teachings of their religion. Proper knowledge of this aspect can help to reduce occasional hostility against Sikhs, arising out of ignorance about its basic principles and the physical appearance of the Khalsa. Sikhs living outside India very often indulge in philanthropy in Punjab by setting up schools, hospitals etc. They need to focus much more on the compatibility of environmental protection and the Sikh religion in channelling their funds for such works. In conclusion, Sikhism is fully compatible with environmental protection, as its teachings emphasise the importance of living in harmony with Nature and preserving the environment for future generations. Sikhs are encouraged to take action to protect the planet and its resources. Many Sikh organisations and Gurdwaras are actively engaged in environmental initiatives. Whether it is through planting trees, conserving water, or raising awareness about climate change, Sikhs are working to make a positive impact on the environment and ensure a sustainable future for all.

SIGNIFICANCE OF TURBAN IN A SIKH'S LIFE








NANAK'S FOOTSTEPS IN EAST AFRICA

A recent discovery suggests that Guru Nanak may have travelled as far as East Africa, besides other parts of the already documented parts of the world. A small settlement, a hundred miles from Kampala, Uganda, is named 'Bamu Nanika' ((Bamu may be a short form of Baba Mungu – Mungu means God in the East African language of Swahili) which the locals there revere for it's spiritual powers. They say that a holy man, not one of their own, sat on a certain spot there and meditated. The spot is covered in a bark-like material and not shown to anyone. Prayers are done in their traditional way. It is also said that all of Uganda's Kabakas (traditional kings) visited the 'shrine' to receive blessings upon their advent of rule.







It is theorised that Guru Nanak may be traversed into Africa down from Arabia, sailed by boat through the River Nile in Egypt and walked through the wilds of Africa and settled in Uganda for a while before making his way back to India from the centuries' old Kenyan coastal town of Mombasa.

It is even believed that in a sakhi, Bhai Mardana asked Guru Nanak why the locals had curly hair. That faintly suggests Guru Nanak's visit to Africa.

The area is arid with no fresh water for miles. But only a few hundred meters away is a small spring of fresh water which the locals do not allow anyone to drink or wash hands with. The water is somehow used, like 'giving amrit' to devotees who are all Africans.


When asked about who they revere the place for, the locals say that, 'He is not one of ours, but there is some great spiritual power here'.

The locals there know not who the Sikhs are, we are strangers to them, but with further research, there is a high possibility of adding Africa's name to the places Guru Nanak travelled to.

KHALSA LAKHVIR-SINGH (Kenya)



Gurdwara Makindu Sahib (rooted since 1898) is considered by Kenya's Sikhs the Harmandar Sahib of Africa because of the sense of serenity it provides to travellers, visitors and devotees from around the world - and for that kind of blessed feeling not felt as strongly in other places certainly has a psiritual reason behind it.

When the Uganda Railway was completed in 1902 at Port Florence (which is now Kisumu, Kenya), Makindu played a prominent role as a service point on the railway's advance from Mombasa. Dozens of artisans and train drivers were Sikhs and the station at Makindu became a place of religious fervour. Sikhs, Hindus and Muslims would gather together in the evenings and sing the praises of God. They did so under a tree, the spot where the current Gurdwara now stands. It is also believed that the Gurdwara was funded by Sikhs and non-Sikhs alike.

The early Gurdwara was a tin-roof little hut, but when the Railway moved on from Makindu, the service point went into disuse and became unimportant. The Sikhs naturally moved along too, leaving their behind their tiny Gurdwara under the watchful eye of an African servant who would clean the Gurdwara. Sikh devotees who passed along the Gurdwara would leave offerings of money by dropping it through the locked Gurdwara's window.

As the years rolled on and the Railway complete, the Sikhs settled in Kenya. Slowly, they began to contemplate the idea of reviving the small Gurdwara in Makindu. Akhand Paths began to be organised on regular weekends, with families travelling 200 miles or so, in rough murram red-soil earth. There, they would gather and pray, prepare langar and socialise. Over the years, the Gurdwara began to be developed.

A copy of the Guru Granth Sahib that survived a mysterious fire which burnt down the whole Gurdwara (probably before 1926) is still there today. I was fortunate to obtain the darshan of the Guru Granth Sahib at a Sikh's residence in Mombasa. On it's first page, the then-Granthi of the Gurdwara recorded, in his own handwriting, exactly what had happened that day, and how miraculously, the Guru Granth Sahib was untouched by the tragedy to the Gurdwara.

An African sevadaar (known only as Gwalo) of the Gurdwara once claimed that he saw, in the night awoken from his sleep, a figure on a white horse. The horseman approached him and spoke to him, telling him not to speak to anyone about the incident of his visit. The startled and shaken man could not believe his eyes and was so scared that he he told the first person he saw the following morning. Asked who the man on the horse was, the African man pointed to a painting of Guru Gobind Singh whish was displayed in the Gurdwara and said, 'That was him! Exactly like the was is there and so was the white horse!' The incident spread through the Sikh community like wild fire and soon people began to come more often to the Gurdwara, regardless of the miles that separated them from it. The incident also prompted the Sant Baba Puran Singh Kerichowale (founder, Guru Nanak Nishkam Sewak Jatha) to lead Gursikhs to gather at the Gurdwara regularly, and serve it by prayer, langar and cleaning. The Gurdwara had been almost forgotten and neglected when Guru Gobind Singh's incident occurred.

That was not the only incident of the darshan of Guru Gobind Singh at Makindu Sahib. People claim to have have heard, in the silent of night, to have heard the approach of horses, just outside the Gurdwara. The sounds were akin to an army, stopping for the night. They claimed that they heard sounds of a kitchen being put in place, like langar was being prepared.

Evidently, the incident was believed to be another darshan of the Guru, stopping by the shrine.

In yet another event, an amazing first-time encounter happened with a member of the Istri Sabha during the early years of the Gurdwara. A lady who was reading the Guru Granth Sahib in the night, lit by only a kerosene lamp (there was no electricity there then), witnessed in the shadow falling on the Guru Granth Sahib. The figure, she recalled, was of someone doing the 'chaur' over the Sikh Scriptures. The figure was, by description, none other than Guru Gobind Singh.

A European visitor narrated how she had stopped at the Gurdwara Sahib for the night on her journey from Mombasa back to Nairobi, and said she had never felt so peaceful in her life before. She even felt the presence of someone seated in the passenger seat as she prepared to drive on the following morning. 'I'm not sure who that was, but I am certain there was someone there,' she explained. 'I didn't get scared, though, I took it as a good omen, like someone was keeping a protective watch over me as i embarked on my journey.'



Like this lady, there are thousands of people who stop by the Gurdwara on their journeys along the busy Mombasa Highway. The Gurdwara attracts people of all races and colour - Hindus, Muslims and Christians. They all drive in like it was home. They always find a meal waiting for them and accommodation to take rest in. They feel no discrimination, or even the slightest hesitation that they are walking through a Gurdwara. It's a power there, I believe, that brings them here - a power that sees no differences. All feel the same bliss, as though they are visiting a Sikh Temple, but walking through God's very own garden.

Through countless other testimonies, is is believed that whatever one asks for at this Gurdwara, it is granted. Wishes have come true, prayers have been answered, if you come with pure intentions, cloaked in humility. Akhand Paths are regularly done there, and requests come from as far away from Europe and Australia where ex-Kenya Sikhs are now settled, and yet remember the beloved Gurdwara they had to leave behind. Had it been in their grasp, they surely would have taken it with them!



The man who towers above all but is found at the feet of the humble, and who turned the unassuming into born immortals was none other than Guru Gobind Singh, the man who in 1699 played a miracle on the minds of his countrymen in a way that they can still stand before the mirror and before men of the world and they would see none

Nanak lived 239 years on this mortal realm - from his first bodily manifestation to his tenth, from a humble and trekking saintly figure to the immovable soliderly figure in the form of Shah-e-Shenshah Guru Gobind Singh. Each form revealed what we would finally be in the mold of his ultimate creation of the Khalsa, the intended vision

In every bodily form of Nanak, his Khalsa can experience him in flesh and blood so long as the Khalsa live by the countless breaths of Nanak's wisdom.

As the Khalsa, we have the greatest and closest relation one can ever have with the Guru, for we become his very own.

When Guru Gobind Singh called upon his Sikhs to assemble at Anandpur Sahib in the early hours of Vaisakh in 1699, little did anyone realise what wondrous play was about to unfold before their very eyes. The Nanak who they knew of and who stated ਜੋ ਉਸਤੇ ਇਹ ਸੰਗੇ ਜੋ ਚਲਣ ਕਾ ਚਾਉਂ ॥
ਸਿਰੁ ਧਰਿ ਤਲੀ ਗਲੀ ਮੇਰੀ ਆਉਂ ॥
ਇਤੁ ਮਾਰਗਿ ਪੈਰੁ ਧਰੀਜੈ ॥
ਸਿਰੁ ਦੀਜੈ ਕਾਣਿ ਨ ਕੀਜੈ ॥

Besides putting the head of the Sikh to the test, Nanak, in his tenth physical appearance, was about to give the greatest gift to one who heeded his callhis very self.

When one Sikh after another arose amongst the crowds of thousands—many of who sat aghast and others taking to their heels—to stand and be counted when the Guru's voice thundered for a head to meet the steel of his brandished, steel-sharp sword, the heavens fell silent as the land of the holy saints was to be awashed with their blood and paradoxically bring back the lifeless to life.

The Guru and the Sikh, one after the other, unflinchingly stood before each other, one with his head raised and the other with his head bowed - and with a single lightning blow, the head of the Sikh fell at the hallowed feet of the Guru.

But when the Guru's divine sword had filled its thirst with five heads, they were brought back to life - all in full view of thousands. What was once a scale of confusion and featured into awe and wonder.

There was no ambiguity left in anyone's mind that the Guru played no tricks with them, hid nothing from them and what he asked for, he took - but in return, he gave back more than what they gave - in exchange of dread, fearlessness; in exchange of doubt, faith; in exchange of loss, gain.



Newly infused with life and taken away to prepare them in their new spiritual and physical forms, the Guru presented to the crowds waiting with baited breath what next the Guru would inspire them with, one could hardly tell the Guru from the five. Not only were they decked out like the Guru, but so was the glow on their faces, radiant like the Guru himself.

Here, the Guru presented multiple duplications of his own self, unmistakably complete and a reflection in themselves what the Guru was. Such was the power that day, that it continues to live amongst us even to this day.

Nanak da chamatkar.

By preparing the Khalsa, who would be dead to the world but alive to the Word, complete in both outward and inner identity of Shabad Guru's wisdom, Nanak's mission was climaxed when, through Shabad Guru, let no one remain lowly but instead raised each to his level by transforming a mere Sikh to Gursikh; Bani to Guru; a human to a devte; a mortal to akaal; a khalis to Khalsa; and Vaisakh to Vaisakhi.

The condition to see the Guru in ourselves and before our selves still remains - to unconditionally give to the Guru what we consider as precious to ourselves and in return receive what the Guru deems invaluable for us.
